Show and Share

Spud Gruman brought a bowl that he turned and wanted someone to identify the wood. He brought several tea lights he had made in different stages of completion from Boxelder and Burls.

Sam Fears showed several tea lights and candle holders he had made in various forms. He had used several types of wood including Boxelder, Russian Olive, burls and Spalted Birch. He talked about having hollowed one piece from both top and bottom and the easier access to seeing the hollowing as it was being done. He also talked about using a Dremel tool with sanding disc to sharpen the hollowing tools.

Ron Day brought a bowl made from Cottonwood and explained the use of turquoise inlace for enhancement.

Louis Pittman brought two bracelets made from Zebra wood and one from plywood. He also brought two hollowing tools he had made using parts of pool cues for handles and tips purchased from Craft Supplies.

Jim Rask brought golf balls that he had made into clocks.

Sister Karen Warren told of having taken 8 bullet pens to a fair for display and sale and ended up getting sales of more than 30 pens after people saw her product. Great Going Karen!!!

Gary Nagel brought back the lidded Cedar box that he had shown before. He had now enhanced it with inlace using Pearl EX powder in copper color where it had cracked.

Mark Kielpinski brought several platters in which he had done inlace to enhance them. Two were showing the "lady bug" theme and two with wagon wheels and an old cabin. He also brought two hollowed vessels which he had found pictures of on the Smithsonian site. They were in the Hopi style. He had used spalted Birch and had used the spindle gouge to create the design along wood burning. He had painted in areas for color design.

Kirk Maize brought in two square bowls he had made from Black Ash Burl and Oak.

Dolly Erickson showed four seam rippers she had made from Russian Olive, Black and White Ebony, and Paduak.

Alan Erickson brought three wine glasses that he had turned wood for the stems. The glass stems were cut and then inserted into the turned wood piece. He brought a wine stopper made from Spalted Birch and had left the raw edge showing. He also brought a miniature birdhouse made from Walnut and Ash in which he had used aniline dye in the roof and base for added color. He brought a shoe horn that he had turned with an extra long Walnut handle.

Mark Gilbertson brought some plastic bottles for give away and Weldee Baetsch brought some tea lights.

Supplies for the 2014 DWT Hands - on Symposium

In addition to the following: Please bring appropriate Lung, Eyes and Ear protection!

ALAN CARTER MATERIAL needed for Symposium

Turning a Goblet

Equipment and toolslathe with #2 Morse taper or adaptor to fit chuck with #2 jaws, such as One-Way stronghold or similar spur or Steb center live center with 1 ½" or larger cone center Jacobs chuck with ½"- 3/4" Forstner bits roughing or bowl gouges various spindle gouges skew 1/16" parting tool

Materials-

2x2x8, straight grained maple or other straight grained wood for the thin stem base, blank needs to fit in jaws after turned to round

2x2x4 turning blanks in contrasting wood for goblet

Note that wood dimensions listed are the actual dimensions. In other words 2x2 doesn't mean 1 3/4x1 /34 the way lumber yards list them. Also, I would prefer not to turn any walnut as I seem to have developed a bit of a reaction to it.

Ron Day Material needed for Symposium

Tools and blanks

Normal turning tools (parting tool, 3/8 or ½ bowl gouge, round nose scraper, skew, etc.) Four jaw chuck with worm screw (ok if they don't have the worm screw)

Wood blanks: 6" to 8" in diameter (or Square) by 3" to 4" thick. I will plan to have enough blanks for all participants to have two blanks. If they want to bring their own blanks, that is fine; however, no exotic woods and avoid black walnut and cedar (folks maybe allergic).

Trent Bosch Material needed for Symposium

Hands on information

Green/wet hollow form blanks, 5- 6" in diameter, 6-7" long end grain, preferably without the pith but we can work with it if they are small diameter trees each person will want to bring 1 piece maybe 2.

As for tools I will bring a good selection of loaner tools for people to use - especially the hollowing tools - but will not be able to bring enough for everybody. I will also bring some to sell (thanks for letting me know that that will be ok) Below is a list of items students may want to bring along: (they do not need to go out and buy any tools though) Chuck





Gary Nagel gave some ideas on how to use extra inlay. He removed it from the container he had mixed it in and then turned it to make an inlay for a box he had turned. Also he showed a box made from kingwood with an inlay. He also explained making a burned grove on the inside of a box.

Ron Day showed an urn he had made from Boxelder and Black Walnut from trees in John Warrens back yard. He presented it to John Warren when finished.

Louis Pittman brought two bowls with natural edges he had turned from Persimmon wood grown in Oklahoma.

Mark Kielpinski showed a southwestern bowl he had turned and had used sharpies for coloring and trimming. One should use extra fine sharpies to create the specific lines. He brought an Elm bowl in which he had used dye to do enhancement on the rim which had been undercut.

Gordon Isaac brought two bowls or vases which he turned from Norfolk Island Pine. The walls were thin enough so light shown through. He had replaced knots that fell out with epoxy enhanced with red glitter.

Duey Marthaller showed two natural edged bowls. One made of ND Cherry and the other of Black Ash burl.

Alice Berning showed two tea lights that were made by Pat Schweitzer that she had enhanced with her paintings.

Alan Erickson showed several different balls he had made free handed, had hollowed out and put bearings inside. He had used several different woods including Eastern Red Cedar and Cocobolo. He also showed two sephericons he had turned, one from Cherry. He also showed a "Faberge' egg box" he had turned using a piece of Walnut that had been partially burned. He also showed a platter and a natural edged bowl made of Black Ash burl.

Alice Berning expressed her THANK YOU to the DWT Club for all the support she has received. She shared an original writing that was written by Norbert called "Kudos to the Dakota Woodturners Members".

The following is from Alice Berning and was written by her late husband Norbert Berning. Alice is willing to share this with all and wants to express her **Thankfulness** for all the support she has received during the passing of Norbert.

KUDOS TO THE DWT MEMBERS FROM NORBERT BERNING

A small or large number of members do not of itself a meaningful, efficient, or productive organization make.

Generally, a club or similar organization is designed to primarily benefit its members, and then, by extension, some elements in the community. But before the "extension" benefits can be realized, the

internal content and process of the club must be well defined and effectively implemented.

The following is a brief assessment of the internal workings of the Dakota Woodturners club.....

After several years of swimming in the D.W.T. acculturation atmosphere some reflections seem to be in order regardless of whether they appear shallow, trivial, or on target to whomever. Being primarily a non-turner member might qualify one to see the structure and function from the "bottom- up." Perhaps that provides for a basic substance and appreciation commentary rather than a view, often of the supercilious kind, from the "top- down."

So, generally, the following is one person's bias---- "reflections in the dust from the back of the herd:"----

- No member, regardless of how deeply he/she is in the shadow of turning knowledge or competency is embarrassed, ridiculed, or despised by the afficionados of turning.
- The willingness and readiness of the veterans of the lathe are unreserved in assisting fellow members whose need of help is small or great.

Pragmatically, provision is made to benefit members' growth in turning in all related circumstances.

There are no "political divisions" or sub-divisions of favorite or non-favorite "sons" on our membership roster.

Unselfish sharing appears to be the medallion feature of our members.





Mark's family, including his wife Thea, two sons, daughter, and grandchildren, benefit from his turning as evidenced by the fact that his first project upon returning to turning was a crochet needle for his wife.

Tip of the Month

When making the final cut or sanding the inside or outside bottom of a bowl or platter we often have difficulty getting a smooth , even contour.

With the lathe <u>stopped</u>, a method that I found to work, and have more success is to "feel" the uneven surface or contour, is by closing my eyes, and turning off my imagination. In other words only let only your sense of touch feel the surface. This seems to take the "visual" sense of the wood grain or color of the wood out of the picture which can often deceive what we are feeling. When a high is felt, (high spots are easier to fix), stop moving your finger and mark the high place with a pencil. This is the location that needs attention with the lathe tool or sandpaper. A scraper works the best.





The following are details of the workshop presented by Pat and Peggy Bookey - October 10, 2014

When: 8:00 AM until 5:00 PM, October 10, 2014

Where: at the home of John Warren: 2434 Roberta Drive North Mandan

Cost: \$75.00 for both sessions

Supplies Needed:

- Face mask to prevent breathing of dust 1.
- 2 soft wood (e.g. Box Elder) dry bowl blanks, 8 inches or less by 3 or 4 inches 2.
- 3. For recommended tools see attached picture

For the piercing session 1/8 inch Baltic Birch plywood will be provided for practice. Any bowls or vessels 1/8 thick or less that have broken may also be used for practicing on a curved surface.

No Walnut or Pecan wood. Presenter is extremely allergic to nuts of all kinds.

Lunch will be served: BBQ Pork sandwiches, baked beans, chips, & slaw. Please bring a lawn chair too. A snack table will be set up if participants would like to bring cookies, bars, etc. (Please remember. NO NUTS!)

Directions: Take the first Mandan exit north after crossing the river (Refinery exit). Take Hwy 1806 north from Mandan. Go approximately 10 miles and turn west on County Hwy 140 (to Harmon Lake). Continue west approximately 1/2 mile and turn left on James Drive (new subdivision).

Turn left on Roberta Drive. House is the first house on the right (Navaho Beige with a copper- colored metal roof).

If you have a drill for piercing, please bring an air compressor to power it. We will need 4 more compressors that can output a constant 28-40 PSI. If you have one we can use please contact Mark Gilbertson.




