Before retirement, George worked for the Information Technical Department for the state of North Dakota. His hobby is hunting. Linda has been his wife for 53 years.



includes working as a concert and artist technician for Steinway and Sons Piano Company and career work at the School of Music at Arizona State University.





Carol is his wife of 47 years. Son Jeremy and wife Jen and daughter Heather and husband Brett have provided Carol and Doug with seven grandchildren.





