Meeting called to order at 8:59 a.m. Secretary's minutes – Motion by Peggy Rask to approve the minutes as published in the newsletter. Second by Dale Sauer. Motion passed.

Old Business:

Freedom pens – Dolly Erickson gave an explanation of the Freedom pen history going that started in 2014. The original idea was to give pens to National Guard troops deploying to write home. Now they are normally given as a thank you when they return from service. 150 pens were given to the National Guard this year. Lieutenant Colonel Bohl and Major Sargent Zacher were at the meeting to accept the pen donation. Additional pen kits are available to check out to make for next year's presentation.

DWT My 2¢ - December 2022

I thought that I would try to focus on a few of the texturing tools that Nick Agar had used during the workshop. I have followed up a bit with some of them so not all the information is a repeat.

Let's start off with the mini carving bit he used. It comes from manpausa and can be found at https://manpausa.com but I was able to find it cheaper at MDI Woodcarvers. The web address is https://mdiwoodcarvers.com and they have the 1/4" and 1/8" Round Carbide Tipped Trim Cutter (44-SCR and 44-DCR) as well as a Triangle Carbide Tipped Trim Cutter (44-SCT and 44-DCT). Do a search for the item number. MDI has a lot of other interesting items as well for carving, sanding and embellishing. I have found that a Dremel tool works well for the carver. I used the 1/8" carver with a collet.

Let's take a look at the larger Robert Sorby texture tools that he had. I saw the large one with one cutter for just under \$100 at Klingspor's Woodworking Shop (https://www.woodworkingshop.com). The smaller one was about \$90. Additional cutters can be purchased for either of these. These can also be purchased from Craft Supply also but are a bit pricier

(https://woodturnerscatalog.com). Something to think about might be to partner up with another turner and each get different complementing tools and share.

Another tool he did not use but had along was the Wagner texturing tool. It's like a knurled surface wheel that is held against the surface of the wood to produce a texture. The texture is similar to the cap of an acorn. Ron Brown also made these for a much lower price and I was unable to find them on his website but was able to find them on the PeachTree site (https://www.ptreeusa.com/turn tools specialty

texturing.html). The Ron Brown are essentially the same as the Wagner for a lower price. The Wagner tools can be found at Craft Supply as well as other woodturning supply companies.

Nick had some background stamps and

punches. He suggested to choose high quality items but was surprised I got the results I did with my 10 for \$20 cheap set. Todd was ingenious enough to go home and make some of his own by grinding some bolts on the end into an interesting pattern. I browsed eBay for some leather working tools and found a leather pounce wheel other tools for about а dollar a piece. They may not last forever but if I get a little and provide use out of them some turnings some variety on then it's a win in my book. I also knurling wheels on found some eBay for about a dollar a piece (I sound really

plus

cheap, don't I) and plan to make a couple of my own "Sorby" texture tools on a smaller scale when I get time. That is the key there, "when I get time". It may never happen and I do have the full size version but I'd like to make a few so I can help others make their own or loan out the ones I do get made. It'd make me "happy".
