Meeting was followed by show & share and a demo from Ron Day on turning log bowls. Special thanks to Kleber for replacing the video camera cables.

Show and Share

Doug Alm brought in a Russian Olive Vase, Larry Nelson brought in a Walnut platter, some pieces from his rose engine lathe, and discussed the 'Batik' method which involves a wax resist and dye.

Pat Schweitzer brought in a shelf arrangement with various small hollowforms, weed pots, and lidded boxes. Jon Schuck Jon brought in a case full of fancy pens that he makes and sells.

Mike Scharnowski brought in an angel, a natural edge laced up bowl, and a segmented piece with purpleheart, pine, cherry, and walnut. He discussed some of the trials and tribulations he faced in the bottom of the segmented piece.

Wayne Peterson brought in two pens that he made using his rose engine lathe.

Mike Orgaard had a staved vase out of big leaf maple and walnut. He also showed a maple bowl. Dave Malarky Dave followed the instructions from Kleber's previous demo and showed a bowl he made from laminated board segments.

Dolly Erickson brought in two woodburnings on hat rims and discussed the process she went through. She showed the final commissioned piece

Jim Porter brought in two walking sticks crafted of sunflower stocks with custom handles. He also made a wavey bowl of oak. Lastly, he brought in a fancy cribbage board table he made years back and challenged anyone to a game.

Marlene Roles brought in a thin pierced bowl with beads inlayed into it. She talked about troubleshooting issues with burn marks and the bottom of the piece.

John Warren brought in the completed pieces from his previous demo. He had two rimmed bowls with iridescent paint, one green and the other black and blue. He had a cosmic bowl completed. He showed the cherry red bowl with orange and yellow hues on ash wood. Lastly, he discussed his new fluting jug and showed the ciolet and cobolt blue platter made on it.

Rebecca Kielpinski brought in bowls showing the various veneers and styles that she would be demoing at our upcoming symposium

Mark Kielpinski had a dozen eggs, two spheres, a bowl with a burnt rim, a butter knife, and spatulas.

George Scholl brought in the honeypot, a maple box covered in beads.
